SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

MAGGIE CAREY

Ms. Carey is currently celebrating more than 20 years with a kidney transplant. She is the second of four generations in her family with polycystic kidney disease. Ms. Carey has served as chair of the Kidney Patient Advisory Council of the ESRD Forum of ESRD Networks; chair of The Midwest Kidney Network's Consumer Committee; and as a member of the Network's Executive, Medical Review Board and Finance Committees. She has also served as a peer resource consultant trainer.

SUSAN CAPONI, MBA, RN, BSN, CPHQ

Ms. Caponi serves as the CEO of IPRO's ESRD Network Program and leads the ESRD Networks of New York, New England, the South Atlantic and the Ohio River Valley. These Networks provide quality improvement, data management, grievance investigation, technical assistance, and patient and professional education services to more than 1,674 dialysis facilities, 117,000 dialysis patients, and 52 transplant centers in 13 states (Connecticut, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island, South Carolina, and Vermont).

Ms. Caponi is a registered nurse and healthcare program executive with more than 30 years' experience, with the last ten years focused on the end-stage renal disease community. Ms. Caponi holds a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing, as well as a master's of business administration. She is also a Certified Professional in Healthcare Quality (CPHQ).

TANJALA PURNELL, PhD, MPH

Dr. Tanjala Purnell, PhD, MPH, is an assistant professor of transplant surgery and epidemiology at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and training director at the Johns Hopkins Center to Eliminate Cardiovascular Health Disparities. Her research focuses on identifying patient-centered and community-engaged solutions to address disparities in access to and quality of care for patients.

Dr. Purnell is a health services researcher and social epidemiologist whose work focuses on identifying and addressing patient/family, healthcare system, and

community-level factors that contribute to health disparities for patients with chronic illnesses, particularly kidney disease and related risk factor conditions, such as diabetes and hypertension.

She has been involved in studies to develop educational and behavioral interventions to reduce disparities in chronic disease management and access to transplantation. She has presented her research at national and international meetings and has received numerous awards and honors.

Dr. Purnell's health equity focused research aims to increase awareness of the serious nature of kidney disease. She is quoted extensively on her research to improve access to kidney transplantation for the African American population and on fostering relationships to teach community members about mechanisms to reduce health disparities.

DANIEL CUKOR, PhD

Dr. Daniel Cukor is an associate professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at SUNY Downstate and the research scientist for the Brooklyn Health Disparity Center. He received his doctorate in Clinical Health Psychology from Ferkauf Graduate School of Psychology/ Albert Einstein College of Medicine. Dr. Cukor has been involved in several nationally funded trials studying the mental health needs of patients with end stage renal disease. His current interests also include health disparities and cognitive behavioral interventions for medication non-compliance, depression, insomnia and pain in patients with renal disease.

ERIN BAUMANN, LMSW

Ms. Baumann joined the IPRO ESRD Network of New York after working as a renal social worker at Long Island Jewish Medical Center. Through her work with patients and the dialysis clinical team she learned first-hand the concerns of the new and existing ESRD patient. This knowledge has had a direct impact on the work she does now as the Network's patient services director.

Ms. Baumann became a social worker after volunteering with the American Cancer Society for many years. She started to volunteer after 9/11 as a way to give back to her community in Rockaway, NY. This led to her pursuit of a

master's degree in social work from Fordham University.

CAROLINE WILLIAMS, RD

Ms. Williams, former chair of the Council on Renal Nutrition of Greater New York, has worked as a renal dietitian for many years. Having worked for the Renal Research Institute, she has conducted studies and done research related to volume control and sodium restriction, as well as bioelectrical impedance analysis. Most recently she participated in a study measuring hemodynamics during hemodialysis in chronic dialysis patients.

JENEEN IWUGO, MPA

Jeneen Iwugo is the Deputy Director of the Quality Improvement & Innovation Group (QIIG) in the Center for Clinical Standards and Quality (CCSQ) at the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS).

With a formal education in speech communication and public policy, she has concentrated her Quality Improvement Organization (QIO) work in the Beneficiary and Family Centered Care tasks of the QIO program. Since joining QIIG in 2008, she has served as a subject matter expert, Government Task Lead, QIO confidentiality regulation lead, Special Assistant and Division Director.

Ms. Iwugo led the revision of the QIO regulations to expand eligibility for QIO contracts beyond the previous state-based structure.

Prior to her various roles within CCSQ, Ms. Iwugo worked for the Center for Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program Services (CHIP) on Medicaid managed care policy, state plan amendments, demonstrations and waivers. She has also served as adjunct faculty for the Community College of Baltimore County.

JANICE HIDALGO, BBA

Ms. Hidalgo is IPRO's director of consumer healthcare engagement programs. Over the past 10 years, she has designed and led robust and successful community education programs providing self management skills to patients living with chronic disease, with a special focus

on Latino and African American populations with diabetes. More than 8,000 individuals have graduated from these programs.

The educational information provided through these programs resulted in healthcare cost savings and in graduates better managing their chronic illness, as evidenced by significant improvements in clinical measures of graduates followed through the program .

Ms. Hidalgo provides technical assistance to community-based organizations; clinicians; health plans; and government agencies, local and federal - including her beloved Puerto Rico - on sustainable community health outreach and education. She is a board member of the American Diabetes Association Greater New York and has a degree in health communications from Universidad Interamericana de Puerto Rico.

TERESA LUBOWSKI, PharmD, BS

Dr. Lubowski has more than 30 years of professional pharmacy experience including institutional practice in multiple states; field and headquarters experience in the pharmaceutical industry; and teaching, administration and research experience in academia. She has experience in antibiotic stewardship in the hospital setting at both Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester and Newark Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark New Jersey; as well as extensive experience in multi-site project management, peer review journal publication, and national meeting abstract and platform presentations.

She is currently a quality improvement specialist at IPRO. Her areas of interest include outcomes research, quality improvement, infectious disease, clinical pharmacy and pharmacoconomics.

Dr. Lubowski completed a BS degree in Pharmacy at the Albany College of Pharmacy, a Pharm D. degree at the University of New York at Buffalo and a two year research fellowship in infectious diseases at the Hartford Hospital in Connecticut.

2017 KATHE LEBEAU PATIENT ADVOCATE AWARD

Kathe LeBeau
1958–2014

The Kathe LeBeau Patient Advocate Award recognizes a single patient's accomplishments in patient advocacy both within and outside of the dialysis clinic.

As director of patient services and public policy for the Northeast Kidney Foundation, Kathe spent countless hours working to inform regulators and policymakers about the critical need for dialysis patients to be educated on all treatment options—and to have access to the option that is best for them. She also advocated for increased organ donation.

Kathe was a reviewer for Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute projects and served on the Anemia Technical Expert Panel, the National Quality Forum, several UNOS committees, the Kidney Community Emergency Response Coalition and the board of the American Association of Kidney Patients. As a participant in these and other groups, it was her goal to ensure that kidney patients live normal lives.

Kathe LeBeau was a nationally known patient advocate for the ESRD community. She served as an IPRO Board Member, IPRO Divisional ESRD Board Member, IPRO ESRD Network of New York Patient Advisory Committee Chair, and Network Council Member. Kathe also volunteered in support of many public and private chronic kidney disease initiatives.

Award Recipient

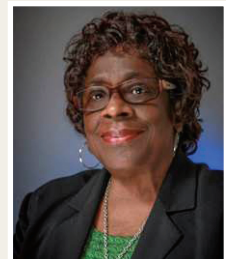
The staff and Patient Advisory Committee of the Network are delighted to present Barbara Breckenridge with the 2017 Kathe LeBeau Patient Advocate Award.

"I am very proud to be a PAC Chair for the IPRO ESRD Network of New York for many years. It is an honor to visit the dialysis centers to encourage and give hope to patients when sometimes there seems to be no hope.

My journey with kidney disease began in 1992. After four years of doctors' appointments and many prayers hoping to never have start dialysis treatments, they began in 1996. This was very horrifying for me, having never seen a dialysis center. When I arrived, I wanted to turn and run, thinking this was my death sentence. After a year of not accepting, and shutting down mentally, I met someone who had been transplanted. Going on the transplant list was a turning point for me; my social worker encouraged me to volunteer with the National Kidney Foundation (NKF), and as a Network PAC Rep for my dialysis center.

In July 1999 I received the long awaited call. After recovery, I became a volunteer member of my transplant center's Pastoral Care team. I continue to visit patients, and sit with families as they wait, offering encouragement and support, helping to alleviate some of their worries and fears. In 2002, another transplant patient and I started a support group; I continue to facilitate monthly meetings.

I have been involved with the Kidney Foundation of WNY in many capacities, currently as director of patient services and community outreach. This wonderful position allows me to assist in many ways: provide advocacy; education; support; peer counseling; emergency financial assistance for food, medicine, household needs, medical ID jewelry, nutritional supplements, and transportation. I also plan social activities including an annual summer cookout and a post-holiday party in January.

As an advocate, I have been honored to be a speaker and have won awards from the NKF, UNYTS, (the local Organ Procurement Organization), the Chris Kluge Foundation, and many other organizations and churches.

As an athlete I have also been blessed with approximately 40 track and field medals at eight US Transplant Games and four world games in Australia, Sweden, South Africa, Argentina, and hopefully, in 2017, Spain!

I thank God and my donor family daily for 18 wonderful years of life and service. My goal is to continue to try to make life better for those in the renal community. I have been given so much, and am very happy and grateful to give back as much as I can."

About ICH CAHPS®

CMS began the national implementation of the In-Center Hemodialysis Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (ICH CAHPS) Survey in calendar year 2014. The ICH CAHPS is designed to measure the experiences of people receiving in-center hemodialysis care at Medicare-certified dialysis facilities. For each semiannual survey,

CMS selects a sample of patients 18 years old and older who have received hemodialysis at their current ICH facility for three months or longer to be surveyed. ICH CAHPS Survey results are publicly reported after a Medicare-certified ICH facility has completed two semiannual surveys.
